ARTIST PROFILES

Hailed for her "power, suppleness, and expressive depth," soprano Mary Sullivan has appeared as a soloist with numerous ensembles in New England. She has appeared as a recitalist at Bowdoin College's Studzinski Recital Hall with pianist and Artist in Residence George Lopez, and has been a featured soloist for Opera Maine. Recent repertoire highlights include the Strauss Vier letzte Lieder; the Mozart Requiem; Handel's Messiah; the Pergolesi Stabat Mater; Mendelssohn's Elijah; and Violetta in Verdi's La Traviata with the Colby College Orchestra.

Ms. Sullivan is the co-founder of Amethyst Chamber Ensemble, which made its debut in 2017. Celebrating the depth of Maine vocal talent and programming to the passions of its members, Amethyst's concerts and salons feature instrumental and vocal chamber works across a variety of genres.

A gifted teacher and vocal coach, Ms. Sullivan coaches vocal technique with several Maine-based choral ensembles, and maintains a private voice studio in Brunswick, Maine.

Linda Brunner, flute, is principal flutist with Maine's Midcoast Symphony Orchestra, and has performed with the Portland Symphony and the Maine State Ballet Orchestra. Linda has been a member of the Midcoast Woodwind Quintet, the Downeast Chamber Players, and the Bangor Symphony, and has taught at the University of Maine in Orono. She retired as Director of The Hallowell Community Band in 2012. For over twenty years, Linda has performed with the Maine Friends of Music, who in the last several of these years have concertized with musicians from the Kent Camerata in Maine, Ohio, Arizona and France.

Brunner, who frequently plays other solo and chamber music engagements, studied flute with Robert Cavally, James Pappoutsakis, and Frances Drinker, earning degrees from the New England Conservatory of Music and the College Conservatory of Music at the University of Cincinnati.

David DeBolt, bassoon, is Professor of Music Emeritus at Kent State University and Adjunct Professor at West Virginia State University. Currently, he is active with the Kent Camerata, a vocal and instrumental ensemble that concertizes internationally. Also, he is Chairman and solo/chamber performer with Concerts @ St. John's in Charleston, WV. His solo CD's, "David DeBolt – Bassoon Music of 20th Century America" (Crystal CD 347) and "A Musical Painting Comes to Life" (Crystal D841) are winning musical praise.

Formerly principal bassoonist of the Kansas City Philharmonic, Tulsa, Birmingham, and Santa Fe Opera orchestras, DeBolt studied bassoon with Bernard Garfield, Harold Goltzer, and with George Wilson at Ohio State University, where he earned degrees.

Sean Fleming, harpsichordist, organist, and pianist, is one of Maine's most sought after collaborative keyboard artists, and has performed with the Maine Friends of Music for over 20 years. He serves as music director and accompanist of the Hearts Ever Young troupe, assistant director and accompanist of Midcoast Community Chorus, and accompanist for Bowdoin Chorus, Lincoln Academy Lincolnaires, Lincoln Festival Chorus, St. Cecilia Chamber Choir, Sheepscot Chorus, and Tapestry Singers. Sean has directed or accompanied over 70 musical theater productions nationwide.

An organ recitalist who has performed throughout the United States, Sean studied organ with Ray Cornils, John Doney, and Gerald McGee, and piano and organ with Michael Lindsey. He is the recipient of a 2009 St. Botolph Club Foundation award for music.
